Don Isaac Abarbanel (1437-1508)

- I. Background: Father (Judah), Grandfather (Samuel)
 - a) Abarbanel
 - 1. Pronunciation
 - 2. Derivation
 - b) Family origins: Fled Castile for Portugal following massacres of 1391
- II. Portugal (Lisbon)
 - a) Mentors: Rav Yosef Hayun, Rav Yosef ibn Shem Tov
 - b) Treasurer to King Alfonso V
 - c) Philanthropy (Redeeming from captivity Jewish community of Arzila, Morocco)
 - d) Death of Alfonso:
 - 1. Accused of conspiracy by son and successor John II
 - 2. Warrant for arrest, fortune confiscated
 - 3. Fled (back) to Castile, settled in Toledo

III. Spain

- a) As a refugee, returned to writing—extraordinary productivity
 - 1. Commentary on Joshua in 16 days
 - 2. Commentary on Judges began on 1st Kislev, finished on the first day of Hanukkah
- b) Summoned to service of Ferdinand and Isabella (united Kingdoms of Aragon and Castile)
 - 1. Financed invasion of Muslim Kingdom of Granada (Andalusia)
- 2. Reconquista complete after 800 years
 - 2.1. Alhambra Decree (Expulsion of Jews from all of Spain) 31 March 1492
 - 2.2. Urging of Torquemada, Inquisitor General and Confessor to the monarchs
 - 2.3. Efforts, in vain, to rescind the decree
 - 2.3.1. Tragedy of Court Rabbi of Castile, Don Abraham Senior of Segovia 2.3.1.1 *Shadchan* of the Royals, powerbroker of the Kingdom, friend

and colleague of Abarbanel

- 2.3.1.2. Baptised together with his family, 15 June 1492
- c) Left with Spanish Exiles on 31 July 1492 (or 2 August 1492=Fast of 9 Av)

IV. Exile and beyond

- a) Naples:
 - 1. Finished Commentary on Kings, begun 8 years earlier
 - 2. Conquered by French, wealth again plundered
- b) Messina (Sicily), Corfu (Greek Isles), Monopoli (Southern Italy)
- c) Finally, Venice (1503): Finance once again
- d) Died 1508, buried in Padua, next to R Judah Mintz (cemetery overrun the following year)

V. Writings

- a) Style (comprehensive, but therefore prolix)
- b) Categories
 - 1. Biblical commentaries (refers to and sometimes endorses Christian commentators)
 - 2. Philosophy (at times defends Rambam but disagrees with excessive rationalism and especially allegorisation of the Torah)
 - 3. Mashiach (apologetics, polemics, consolation of the Exiles)
